This workshop will focus on the notion of Ethnolinguistic Vitality first proposed by Giles, Bourhis & Taylor (1977, "Towards a theory of language in ethnic group relations. Apart from introducing and charting the development of the concept, the workshop will explore the utility of the notion for the "Language as a Cure" project on the first two days.
